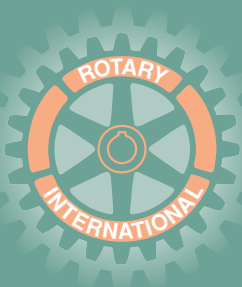

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

As a volunteer organization with over 31,000 clubs in more than 165 countries, Rotary initiates humanitarian programs that address today's challenging issues, such as hunger, poverty, and illiteracy. Founded in 1905, Rotary was the world's first service club and remains the most international of all the world's service club organizations. The organization is nonpolitical (nongovernmental) and nonsectarian. Rotary's motto is "Service Above Self."

Rotary club members represent a cross-section of business and professional leaders worldwide. These 1.2 million men and women donate their expertise, time, and money to support local and international projects that help people in need and promote understanding among cultures. More than 31,300 Rotary clubs meet weekly to enjoy each other's fellowship and discuss the club's service goals. Membership is by invitation and is based on representation of each type of business, profession, and institutions to ensure a cross section of community leadership.

The main objective of Rotary is service – in the community, in the workplace, and throughout the world. Rotarians develop community service projects that address many of today's most critical issues, such as children at risk, poverty and hunger, the environment, illiteracy, and violence. They also support programs for youth, education opportunities, vocational and career development, and international exchanges for students, teachers, and other professionals.

Rotary's flagship program is its effort to protect children against the polio, with the goal of ending the disease throughout the world.

THE ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to support the efforts of Rotary International in the fulfillment of the Object of Rotary, Rotary's mission, and the achievement of world understanding and peace through local, national, and international humanitarian, educational, and cultural programs.

Voluntary contributions of Rotarians and friends of Rotary support the International Foundation. All International Rotary Foundation awards and grants are made in conjunction with Rotary club and district international service activities. Applications for funding must be initiated by a Rotary club or district.

Glenn E. Estess, Sr. is the Retired Chief Executive Officer of Glenn Estess Associates, Inc. Born in Pike County, Mississippi; he earned a degree in Chemistry and Physics from Tulane University in New Orleans, Louisiana. Glenn is one of five brothers who were Rotarians. Four were Presidents of their respective clubs in four different cities in three states.

Glenn is past chairman of trustees of the Baptist Health Systems, an eleven-hospital system headquartered in Birmingham, Alabama with approximately 10,000 employees. He served as director of the Better Business Bureau of Central Alabama and as a trustee for the Workmen's Compensation Trust of the Business Council of Alabama. Earlier in Florida he was chairman of the YMCA, the American Chemical Society and the Arthritis Foundation. He was also a member of the Board of Regents of the National Association of Personnel Consultants in the United States.

A Rotarian since 1960, Glenn was a member first in club #41 at Jacksonville, Florida (USA), and then Wayne, New Jersey (USA). Glenn was an Advisor to the 1997 RI Convention Committee, PolioPlus National Coordinator in 1987-88. During his tenure as a Trustee, Glenn served as Chairman of the Foundation's Finance Committee and Vice Chairman of its Program Committee. He was RI's International Assembly Chairman and Moderator in 1999.

He formerly was a member for four years and Chairman for one year of RI's Audit & Operations Review Committee. This is RI's only committee having a six-year term.. This Committee serves in an Advisory role to the Board of Directors. Glenn was also the Chair of the 2002-2003 Membership Development and Retention Committee.

Glenn is a Rotary Foundation Major Donor, a Paul Harris Fellow, and a Benefactor. He is the recipient of the Citation for Meritorious Service, the Service Above Self Award, and The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award.

Glenn and Mary have three children and eight grandchildren. Sixteen members of his family are Paul Harris Fellows.

He will serve as President of Rotary International for its Centennial year of 2004-2005.

ROTARY CLUB OF PORTLAND COMMITTEES

Active members participate in at least one committee and receive attendance credit when present at a committee meeting, Tuesday luncheon, or Rotary social event. **Honorary members** do not have a committee or attendance requirement but are encouraged to attend Tuesday luncheon meetings and are welcome to attend any committee meeting without notice or invitation. Committee meetings are posted in Spokes, the Website and in the elevator lobby of the hotel if meetings occur Tuesday at the hotel. All standing committee meetings are open to all members. Members are encouraged to initiate new activities that meet their and other members' interest and should notify the office of such activities that are planned.

In this directory, committee listings are organized in groups represented by a numbering system (100's, 200's etc.). Each major grouping represents an Avenue of Rotary Service, namely Club Service, Community Service, Vocational Service, and International Service. Members usually initiate toward an Avenue of Service and a committee that meets their interests and their unique competencies. It is unusual for a member of this large club to be unable to enhance his or her interest through involvement in one or more of the many committees.

ROTARIAN VOLUNTEER POLICY

Volunteers will freely give of their services under the four avenues of Rotary Service: Club Service, Community Service, Vocational Service, International Service.

All volunteers will follow the object of Rotary, which is to encourage and foster the ideal of service. Each volunteer will do so because of his/her own desire to help and promote the good of the club. The service is done of free will with no expectation of monetary reimbursement or reduction of dues unless pre-approved by the Club Board prior to the service rendered.
